What is a Project?


Key attributes:

- Temporary endeavor
- With a <u>defined beginning and end</u>
- ► To achieve <u>unique goals and objectives</u>
- may involve cross organization or cross functional teams
 restricted by <u>Triple Constraints</u> time, cost, scope objectives

In contrast to Operations

- Work done every day
- Generally routine and repetitive


Triple Constraints



The attributes, usually in opposition, that a project manager must manage to successfully complete a project.

The Scope - the activities, the work that will be done to complete the project.


Time, Cost and Scope - need to be in equilibrium to result in success.




Scope Creep - when stakeholders ask for additional scope, without negotiating corresponding time and cost. Scope creep throws the project out of equilibrium.

Project managers manage expectations by managing the triple constraints.

Expectations Management

Oxford Dictionaries defines Manage Expectations as

"Seek to prevent disappointment by establishing in

advance what can realistically be achieved or

delivered by a project, undertaking, course of

action, etc."

Deliverables

A **deliverable** is a tangible or intangible good or service produced as a result of a project that is intended to be delivered to a customer (either internal or external).

A **deliverable** could be a progress report, a chart review summary, a software product, a server upgrade or any other building block of an overall project.

A **deliverable** may be composed of multiple smaller deliverables

Completion Criteria

Define 'done'

The conditions that a deliverable must satisfy to be accepted by a user or customer

Avoid 'squishy' criteria such as "Easy to use", "sufficient"

"complete" – without including concrete descriptions to explain

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what these mean.

Completion Criteria - Documentation of Informed Consent

- Documentation of Informed Consent will be considered complete when:
 - The correct version of the Informed Consent Form has been used
 - The Signature and Date Signed are included on the form
 - Cover sheet of attestations is complete with all required signatures,
 - The attestation of review is included
 - The attestation that questions have been answered is included
 - The screening history is documented
 - SOP for electronic consent has been followed

Completion Criteria - Serious Adverse Event Report

- Serious Adverse Event Report will be considered complete when:
 - The event is classified as to severity, expectedness, relatedness
 - The report was submitted within the required timeframe for the trial
 - The event is recorded in both the source data (commonly medical notes)

and the adverse event log

- The event report complies with the protocols established for the trial
- The outcome of the event is documented to demonstrate it has been followed to its resolution
